


Hopefully you were able to enjoy the many events of the Big Rapids Festival of the Arts. If you attended any of the events, please let Jerena know.

Sequoia National Park



Established September 25, 1890, to protect the *Sequoiadendron giganteum* (giant sequoia) from being logged, Sequoia National Park is our country's second national park. It is in California's Sierra Nevada mountains and is adjacent to Kings Canyon National Park. In addition to its huge sequoia trees, many grouped in the Great Forest, it also features Mount Whitney and Moro Rock for climbing enthusiasts; Crystal Cave, an underground cavern with streams and stalactite rock formations; and campgrounds, lodges, and a tented camp for overnight stays.

Many people visit the park to see the giant sequoias including the General Sherman Tree which is the world's largest tree measured by volume. It is 275 feet tall and over 36 feet in diameter at the base. It is believed to be over 2,000 years old although another tree, the President Tree, is believed to be over 3,200 years old. The giant sequoia trees have the largest mass while California's coastal redwoods are the world's tallest trees. In addition to the 8,000 trees in the Great Forest, other groupings of trees include The House and Senate groves, as well as many magnificent trees along the Congress Trail.

When planning a trip to Sequoia's 404,063 acres, there are four main areas to consider visiting: the foothills full of wildflowers, the Giant Forest and Lodgepole areas, Moro Rock, and Mineral King, a subalpine valley. Since 84 percent of Sequoia and Kings Canyon National Parks have been designated as wilderness, the land is accessible only by foot or horseback. Wildlife normally seen in the park include bobcats, foxes, ground squirrels, rattlesnakes, and mule deer. Mountain lions and the Pacific fisher also exist but sightings are rare. There are no longer any grizzly bears in the park.

I have traveled in Europe, hiked in the Swiss alps, and lived on both coasts but visiting the sequoia trees has been a highlight in my life. One feels very small next to them but close to God at the same time.
